Technology

NewsRx employs a significant number of proprietary software technologies which focus on automating every aspect of publishing from writing and editing to layout and distribution. One of its most innovative software packages created at NewsRx is AIJ, which stands for Artificial Intelligence Journalist. Artificial Intelligence is a branch of computer science that allows machines and software to participate in the concepts of knowledge and communication.

NewsRx was the first company with true artificial intelligence software designed for the publishing industry. The system has developed and grown from the beginnings of the company and has taken a full 25 years to create. It also involves robotics and machine learning, as well as algorithms, logic and automated reasoning. AIJ is truly considered an emerging technology developing from the original philosophy on artificial intelligence: “Can machines actually think?”

Among the advantages of AIJ to users is accelerating the time from event to distribution. For example, AIJ can perform many of the routine tasks of a reporter, a graphic designer, an electronic publisher, and in some cases, even more advanced tasks such as writing books. As a result, NewsRx is known for being the first to distribute news and information on most topics, and the first to have the ability to cover all the events that take place in the world each day in a particular field or area of interest.

Internet sites with our content have over 3 million readers a month, and NewsRx has won eleven eHealthcare leadership awards including Best Healthcare Content and Best Overall Internet Site.

Our First 30 Years Began by Serving Others

In 1984, an Atlanta company did the unthinkable. At a time when most Americans had yet to hear that the AIDS virus existed and was spreading rapidly, NewsRx decided to distribute an international publication that would inform and educate people interested in the subject, especially researchers and practitioners in the health and medical field. It was a bold step, and although there were detractors, many others supported it. Confident that the publication would find an audience, NewsRx began research and information gathering, developed a core group of subscribers and launched the first issue of *AIDS Weekly* in 1985.

Initially, the publication covered all aspects of the disease from social to medical, and it was distributed to a diverse international readership. At the time, there were no other publications reporting exclusively on the AIDS epidemic. *AIDS Weekly* was the first, and throughout its 30-year history, the most respected.

Getting started, however, was sometimes a rocky road. The controversies became national and international and even reached the pages of

NEWSRx

Newsweek magazine. At issue was the idea that a non-government entity was reporting on topics that included policy, research and statistics about the disease that some insiders at the U.S. Centers for Disease Control & Prevention (CDC) considered the exclusive mission of the government. But most staffers within the agency saw the wisdom of having an external publisher reporting information objectively, and a subsequent article in the *Boston Globe* touted *AIDS Weekly* as a necessary “watchdog” publication. Other positive articles then appeared in *The Wall Street Journal* and *The New York Times*, and another in *USA Today* characterized the publication as having a major impact in the area of AIDS awareness and investigative journalism.

While most of the content was gathered from the CDC at first, *AIDS Weekly* expanded its reach and began to monitor other agencies and organizations internationally. The goal was to be sure nothing went unreported, and if there were events or information that were still unfolding, the publication included “shorts” that explained as much as was known, with the promise that details would follow as soon as they were uncovered. To ensure that the publication was thorough, NewsRx staff plowed through health journals and conducted exhaustive research at Emory University’s medical library. The company pioneered

AIDS

a form of reporting findings that became the model for writers at *AIDS Weekly* and subsequent NewsRx publications through the years.

In time, as *AIDS Weekly* became an industry standard, the company realized that the publication itself could be a model for sister publications reporting on other medical diseases and health issues. First to follow was *Cancer Weekly*, which made particularly good sense because the American Cancer Society national headquarters were directly across the street from the CDC. Then came *Vaccine Weekly*, and then a series of medical-oriented titles that ultimately totalled about a hundred. NewsRx became an internationally-recognized publisher of medical periodicals and a respected leader in the industry.

Through the years, NewsRx lived by the principle that important medical and health information belongs to the public, and it supported organizations who shared that belief. One is AIDS Education Global Information Systems (AEGIS), a worldwide clearinghouse of AIDS information, which used a significant amount of content gathered from *AIDS Weekly* staff researchers as it became the world's largest database on the subject. As a result, NewsRx became an important partner in the AEGIS Millennium Collection at the United Nations, part of UNESCO's Memory of the World program.

NewsRx gained momentum through the 1980s and 1990s as the company expanded its publishing services to include a far-reaching variety of health and medical topics. As new topics of interest emerged, the company led the industry in covering them, just as it had with *AIDS Weekly*. Following that model, NewsRx employed writers to conduct information gathering to produce content that would keep the growing readership informed and enlightened. By the dawning of the new millennium, NewsRx titles had reached a hundred and covered almost every conceivable health and medical topic.

We Expanded with VerticalNews

In the early part of the 2000s, NewsRx then decided to move outside medical and health into science and other topics. The result was VerticalNews, an initiative through which the company emphasized distribution of valuable information on a global scale while it improved its packaging. The goal was to deliver content that was easy to read quickly, electronically as well as in print, with titles that accurately defined the content. The formula has worked well, and to its subscribers, VerticalNews content has become a “morning brief,” with summaries of everything that happened in the world related to specific topics relevant to their fields of endeavour.

Today, the company’s VerticalNews distribution reaches a global audience that spans more than 50 countries.

The Current Decade Leaps into the Future

Rather than short-term profits, the focus of the current decade has been on new technology, startups, and securing major partners as resellers for long-term growth.

Our new close partners PubzMe, ScholarlyMedia and iPaperz exclusively use only NewsRx licensed content.

Our international content partners are Cambridge Information Group/ProQuest/Dialog, News Corporation/Dow Jones/Wall Street Journal Professional Edition/Factiva, Thomson Reuters/West Publishing and Gale/Cengage Learning.

The company is transitioning from a news publisher to a digital news, publishing technology and IT company, with innovations including an automated article writing and periodical production software platform (Artificial Intelligence Journalist – AIJ) producing 35,000 unique articles weekly and 195 auto-created digital newsweeklies.

In 2013 the company launched its newsweeklies in digital format at the Apple Newsstand and via Google Play.

The company is heavy in health, biotech, patent, investment, business, and science news, and is moving into text-based analytics in the financial and healthcare IT areas in 2014.

The company owns a 6-million-article database focusing on 25 years of discoveries and prior art for patents and litigation.

PubzMe, LLC

Partnered with Getty Images – Opening the World of New Discoveries to Content Creators

PubzMe has the goal of opening the world of news about discoveries to everyone. The company emphasizes accuracy, authority, attribution, and access.

Focusing on scholarly news, patent news, SEC financial news, and company/institutional news announcements, content is sold in partnership with Getty Images to anyone needing content for news, books, blogs and websites. News can be re-purposed and images can be distributed with the articles.

The focus of this project is the Pubz.Me e-commerce website which sells the content. This type of content is difficult to find and is lost in the world of academia and a few professional markets.

With content marketing on the rise, about 60% of marketers plan to increase their content marketing spending budgets. There is a growing demand for new and original content.

The PubzMe partnership with Getty Images provides customers with high definition images at a fraction of the regular cost, and the addition of video content via Getty is planned.

The company licenses the six million article NewsRx database focusing on 25 years of discoveries.

Company technology includes the ability to turn database search results into an eBook automatically through artificial intelligence, and a future product using this technology is planned at PubzPro.

PubzMe, LLC owns the registered trademark for the word PUBZ as it applies to publishing, online and digital content.

ScholarlyMedia, LLC

Mid-sized Book Publisher – Over 2,000 Reference Books Annually

ScholarlyMedia is a book publisher producing 2,000 annual scholarly reference books in print, PDF and ePub formats under the *ScholarlyEditions* imprint of ScholarlyMedia, LLC.

After first being test marketed and successfully launched to the university library market by Proquest's ebrary, a 2013 contract was signed with Ingram for print distribution and eBook distribution at MyiLibrary and to all 200+ Ingram CoreSource business partners, including Amazon, Bookish, Books-a-Million, JSTOR, OverDrive, Ovid, Sony, EBSCO, Barnes & Noble, Nook, and others.

The total number doubles to over 4,000 eBooks in 2013, and to 6,000 reference eBooks and 4,000 print books by 2014.

The books are written and produced by our artificial intelligence automated systems (AIJ), which not only produce the textual content, but also create the cover graphics, content pages, chapter highlights and indexes for each book and eBook. Ingram sells print versions using its new POD system. ScholarlyMedia licenses its content from NewsRx.

iPaperz, LLC

Daily News for Mobile Devices

iPaperz launched news apps for Android devices, iPhones and iPads in 2013, with a schedule calling for 3-4 news apps to be introduced each month over an extended period of time.
